

Herndon Naval officer honored posthumously

The late Rear Adm. Daniel J. in October 1956. Wolkensdorfer, a native of Herndon, will be inducted into the Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance 18 at Jacksonville, and then with Hall of Honor at Naval Air Station VP-11 at NAS Brunswick, Maine, Jacksonville, Fla., on Wednesday, both flying the P2 "Neptune." In March 28

He is one of only three 2012 inductees. The others are Cmdr. Scott Carpenter, one of the original Mercury astronauts, and Capt. Arnold Isbell, a pioneer in this aviation specialty.

Admiral Wolkensdorfer was born May 11, 1932, to Mr. and Mrs. Albin Wolkensdorfer of Herndon. He graduated from Hern-

don High School in 1950 and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in civil engineering from the University of Nebraska in 1955.

He was commissioned through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps and reported to the Naval Air Training Command in June 1955. He was designated a Naval Aviator

He completed two consecutive patrol squadron tours, first with VP-July 1960, he reported to

the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, Calif., where he earned a Master of Science degree in physics and was elected to the honorary research fraternity, Sigma Ii. He retired in January

1991 after a 35-year career in antisubmarine warfare planning, acquisition, testing and operations. He

continued to work as a government contractor, pursuing the latest technology and getting it to the fleet. He died in 2006 and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

He and his wife Carolyn were married in 1955 in Ravenna, Neb., and they had two daughters and a son. His wife lives in Towson, Md.

She said Haiti has 9 million people. Half are illiterate and most live on less than \$2 per day. The focus on the many volunteers and organizations that go into Haiti is on water projects. Her son Mike has been working to improve sanitary water conditions for many in Haiti. Wells have been dug and pumps installed to avoid contamination.

Some 66.000 children die each year from cholera, diarrhea and other diseases related to dirty water, she said. She has asked Rotary to help with a grant for improving the water conditions in Haiti and improve the health, education and self sufficiency and jobs for its
