Council agrees to pay on repairs for ranch house

c.haynes@nwkansas.com The old caretaker's house at Sappa Park Ranch, later used as an office, is worth saving, the Oberlin City Council agreed Thursday, voting to put up to \$3,500 into removing mold and other repairs.

The council reviewed a letter from Allan Langness of Langness Repairs of Goodland. Mr. Langness said he has inspected the house and it appears structurally sound. Mold damage can be repaired, he said, estimating the cost of repairs and treatment at \$1,200 to \$3,500 depending on how much needs to be done once the full extent of the damage and material costs are known.

Council members said they thought that the city could afford to do that much to save the building since there is money in a special budget fund for the ranch. A vote on the project passed 4 to 1 with Councilman Rob McFee voting no.

In other business, the council:
