Girl Scouts unpack donated cookies

Oberlin Girl Scouts delivered 35 boxes of cookies to the Decatur County Food Pantry in the basement of the United Church on Friday. The girls sold the cookies during their annual drive as part of the Cookie Share program. Becky Ayers, membership volunteer program specialist, said people had the option of buying cookies and donating them to the pantry, the Kansas Food Bank, the Kansas National Guard or Catholic Charities. Jacquelyn Marshall, Hannah Jones, Calista Isbell, Mackenzie Urban, Maci Weigle and Morgan Jones delivered the cookies to the

pantry around noon. Jacquelyn said she likes being a Girl Scout because of the activities. She said she enjoyed a sleepover at the Hays Mall. Her mom, Joni Marshall, who is a troop leader, said the top cookie seller in Oberlin was Alicia Salem, who sold over 600 boxes. Fifty-four girls are enrolled in Scouts in Oberlin, said Mrs. Ayers. The troops normally have an enrollment period at the beginning of school and will be looking for more. Hannah said other girls should get into scouting because it's fun. Calista said Girl Scouts has

helped her learn to be responsible. Melanie Anderson, who runs the pantry, said the cookies will be a nice treat for the pantry's clients. She told the girls that when people run out of food and aren't able to buy any, they can come to the pantry and fill out a form and then pick out items they like or will use. Those people can also go to the store and get a few fresh things. Mrs. Ayers said she was proud of all the girls for supporting the pantry. Part of the Girl Scout code, she said, is to "Make the world a better place."

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Mr. Seavey was found guilty and fined \$54 and court costs of \$24. The trial took two days and H.R. Marietta was the judge.
• July 17, 1905, Corda Bradley, Cecil Bradley, Clarence Miner, Emery Peters, Chelly Smith, I.K. Johnson and Ed Grossniklaus were all charged with using profane and obscene language. The first six men pled guilty and were each fined \$1 with costs of \$1. Grossniklaus pled not guilty and was found not guilty and released.
• Dec. 25, 1905, John Doe Real Name Unknown was charged with drunkenness, disorderly conduct and the use of profane and obscene

language.
The next day Marshal C. Williams appeared with the defendant, who pled guilty (*but apparently did not give his name*). He was fined \$10 and \$5 court costs and released.
Getting drunk caused problems for several other people

While the citizens seldom backed out of their driveways into parked cars back in 1906, they did end up in court for traffic offenses.
