be initiated within a very short time frame, it's crucial that medical facilities, regardless of size, be prepared to evaluate and treat these patients, and if necessary, transfer them to a larger facility," said Dr. Colleen Leckenberg, a neurologist and chair of the state Stroke Task Force. "In Kansas, we are calling that readiness Emergent Stroke Ready. Without these facilities, treatment options are greatly reduced.

We are very excited to work with the American Heart Association and the American Stroke Association on providing stroke care to patients presenting to our facility," said Administrator Lynn Doeden. "Our emergency room nurses and providers are educated to diagnose, treat and transport acute stroke patients to the appropriate care facility as


