Mrs. Louderback and her husband Alex have a 20-month-old son, Brennen.



# Church plans to hold blood drive on Friday

The Jennings United Methodist Church will hold a Red Cross blood drive from 8:30 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. on Friday, at the church, 202 S. Topeka.

The Red Cross says its blood supply has reached emergency levels, with only half the readily available blood products on hand at this time last year. All blood types are needed but especially O positive, O negative, B negative and A negative, said Mayor Marge Hartzog, who is heading up the drive in Jennings.

Every day, the Central Plains Blood Services Region which serves most of Kansas and northern Oklahoma, must collect 500 pints (units) of blood to meet demand, the Red Cross says. Each pint of whole blood may help save more the chance that a doctor could post-

donors will be eligible to win a Gibson guitar, courtesy of the Gibson Foundation. Anyone who offers to donate will also receive a rock-androll-themed T-shirt while supplies last. A special incentive for donors ages 16 to 21 is a drawing for a \$5,000 scholarship.

Jennings has met or exceeded its quota at each blood drive, Mrs. Hartzog said. The drives were begun as a tribute to Lawrence Jennings, who received many units of blood during his illness with acute leukemia. The blood and blood products collected at this site are used for patients in the northwest Kansas area, she said.
