The Civilian Conservation Corps check at the entrance gate showed that 800 cars entered Sappa State 50 YEARS AGO — July 1962 Park during the day. In the evening the crowd commenced pouring into town for the baseball game between 30 bushel range. Herndon and Oberlin played under the floodlights and the fireworks display which followed. A pavement dance and two public dances attracted large gatherings as the finale of the day' activities. First reports indicate a light wheat
