Are foods safe after outage?

Frequently questions come in to me about what to do with food when there is a power outage, whether it is in the winter or summer. The answer is the same: With a long-term power outage throw out any refrigerated or frozen foods if you're not certain of

Determining whether perishable foods are safe after a power outage can involve some guesswork, but the rule of "when in doubt, throw it out" stands.

For many people, it's difficult to throw away food if it's not crystal clear that it's been spoiled. If there's a strange odor, definitely throw it away. But sometimes, there's no outward sign that food has gone bad, especially if it's been thawed then re-frozen before it's checked. If there's any chance that a per-

illness from food-borne disease, including children; pregnant women; the elderly; and people with diabetes or other chronic health conditions.

It's not always easy to tell how long a refrigerator or freezer compartment has been too warm, but a sure sign that a freezer has reached temperatures above 32 degrees is if ice cubes have melted. That's obvious in freezers that have storage containers for loose ice cubes; they would re-freeze into a large sheet. Homeowners who just have ice cube trays (in which the ice would re-freeze into cubes) should get in the habit of keeping a few cubes in a zip-close bag in the freezer to make it easier to tell if the compartment has reached above freezing during

In addition, it's important to know that if foods have been in the danger zone for two hours or more, even cooking them won't kill all germs that could cause illness. Here are some general tips to follow:

When the power is out, keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed to keep the cold in.

Food in chest-type freezers that are full or nearly full will keep for 24 hours or longer if the door is not opened. For long term power outages, try using dry ice to keep food frozen: 25 pounds of dry ice should hold a 10 cubic foot full freezer for two to four days.

Generally, it is safe to re-freeze foods that still contain ice crystals.

If frozen foods have partially thawed, they may or may not be able to be re-frozen. Uncooked meat and poultry can be re-frozen if odor is normal. Fish, shellfish, casseroles and other combination dishes should not be re-frozen.

What do Christians believe? Roy Matthewson, Lund Covenant Church

What if I told you that the world is flat? Indeed, what to 4000 years ago and completed about 2000 years if I told you that there is water all around the earth, that there is a dome over the fields, mountains and forests protecting it from the water above us, and that Hades is somewhere below the earth? There is a group that believes this is the case because this is how the Bible describes the world.

What would happen to your faith if you learned that there was no Adam and there was no Eve as understood in Genesis? Would you think the person who told you that was at best a heretic? Could your faith in God survive such news? How would you make sense of this and believe the Bible tells us anything true about God?

I ask because a huge barrier between the Church and many of my non-Christian friends is our apparent uncritical, unscientific mindset. Non-Christians look at Christians and believe we are generally unthinking simpletons. The perceived conflict between faith in God and scientific knowledge turns non-Christians away. I believe they conclude that it is essential for people to discard the belief in scientific discoveries in order to be Christians.

It is possible to both acknowledge the sovereignty of God as Creator and accept the scientific discoveries of the last 500 years. To do this we may have to renew our minds and adjust the ways we think. We can show that Christians are comfortable in the 21st century and in so doing will bring down this intellectual barrier to the Gospel. It is possible to do this in a way that does not weaken the Word of God as well.

The most important step is to acknowledge that the time gap between the development of the scientific method and the world view it created and the stronger as a result. Blessings. composition of Scripture is huge. First written up

ago, the Bible was written by people who did not think "scientifically"—at least, not in the way that we think scientifically. Our scientific world view began to take shape about 1100-1300 years after the scriptures were completed and termed normative by the Church Councils.

Thinking scientifically is second nature to us. We are not even aware that this is the way in which we think because it is how we learn to think from the moment we are born. We are immersed in this mindset in much the same way that a fish swimming in a lake is unaware that it is wet. The water is the fish's world, just as the scientific paradigm is ours.

Where problems develop is when we approach a book written centuries before the scientific mindset developed and ask it our standard questions. We want to know where exactly the Garden of Eden was located. But we know that the sources of the Tigris, Euphrates and Nile referred to as flowing out of the Garden are hundreds miles, if not continents apart. So where exactly is the Garden? If we cannot find it we may conclude that the angel God has guarding it, hides it very well. We may conclude that it never even existed. Or we could conclude that since the Bible is interested in telling us who we are, it is not concerned scientifically with how we got to be here.

I intend to pick up from this point in next week's article, but let me assure you that I believe in the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, that God created the universe, and that we can trust the Holy Spirit to guide us into all truth. I pray your faith will not waiver as you consider these ideas, but that it will become
