# **Emergency loans** available in county

Emergency disaster loans are at (785) 877-5156. available for farmers and small businesses in Decatur County affected by the drought, government agencies said Thursday in the wake of a federal disaster declaration including the county.

Farmers who have lost at least 30 percent of a livestock type or crop since Jan. 1 may qualify for emergency loans, said Pat Bohl, a farm loan officer in the Norton County office of the U.S. Farm Service Agency. Applicants must also be running a "family-size" farm or ranch and not be able to get credit elsewhere.

The agency can make loans for up to 100 percent of the losses that qualify. They'll be made at a 3.75 percent interest and scheduled for met had the disaster not occurred," repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with ability to pay.

The loans can be used to replace homes, buildings, livestock, installations and equipment or to buy fertilizer, livestock, feed, seed and even to make payments on debts.

"Funds can also be used for other essential operating and living expenses," Mr. Bohl said.

#### Small businesses that depend on the farming industry also may be eligible for low-interest federal disaster loans.

Those interested in getting a loan must have been directly affected by the disaster, said Alfred Judd, director of the U.S. Small Business Administration's west disaster field operations center.

Those who may qualify for loans of up to \$2 million dollars include small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses in aquaculture, small nonfarm businesses and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size. The loans are "to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been the administration said.

"Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage," Mr. Judd said. "These loans have an interest rate of 4 percent for businesses and 3 percent for nonprofits, and a maximum term of 30 years."


