Firemen's fund raiser brings 300 people together for picnic

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As many as 300 people showed up for a fund raiser for the Decatur County Rural Fire Department on Wednesday at City Park, eating 180 hamburgers, 110 polish sausages and 32 hot dogs.

"It was a really good turnout," Fire Chief Bill Cathcart said at the event. "I'd just like to thank everybody who came down for their support."

During the picnic, Kimberly Davis, assistant publisher of The Oberlin Herald, presented Chief Cathcart and Ambulance Director Linda Manning with checks for \$756 and \$300, respectively. The Herald also gave \$300 to help pay for the meat for the fund raiser, for a total of \$1,356.

At the beginning of July, Mrs. Davis said, *The* Herald produced a four-page fire extra edition on the July 3 and 4 wildfires. The special was sold for a donation, with that money being donated to the fire department and ambulance service.

Mrs. Davis thanked the fire and ambulance volunteers for continuing to answer the call of duty time and time again. The special fire edition raised just under \$1,400, she said. All of that money has been given to benefit the emergency departments. Advertising revenue went to pay production costs.

Volunteers from all three county fire departments - Oberlin, Jennings and Norcatur –came in their blue uniforms.

The Oberlin Area Concert Band played for the pic-

nickers, and Dianne Bremer, one of the organizers, set up a table to collect donations for the firemen's equipment fund, raising over \$8,000.

'Donations are going to the Rural Fire Department; that's who checks should be assigned to," said Mrs. Bremer.

She said that when it came time to set up for the event, volunteers "just showed up" as if by magic. Her stand featured a photo of her family's one-of-akind, 95-year-old barn that was lost in the largest of the fires, alongside a shot of it burning during that It was a sober reminder that though no homes or

lives were lost, much valuable property was. Everyone had come together to celebrate the firemen and other emergency workers, and to do something for them. "We never appreciate our old buildings until

they're gone," said Linda Wade as she gazed at the

photos. Mrs. Bremer said the family plans to build a new barn by next spring, but more modern, not in the same style as the old one. Shirley Shields, Joyce Hartzog, Teresa Shaughnessy, Mrs. Wade and Mrs. Bremer put together the

event. Mrs. Bremer said she would like to thank everyone who gave money, time and materials.

"They helped make it a success," she said. Mrs. Bremer said she also will be taking dona-

sdecamp@nwkansas.com Decatur County's audit report for 2011 is the best it's had in years, county commissioners heard last Tuesday, though one item did go slightly over budget. "Everything went smoothly, and

very well," said Bryan Thompson, a certified public accountant with the Norton accounting firm of Mapes and Miller. "This is the earliest it's ever been done, and there is nothing out of the ordinary."

The county accrued no new debts for the year, he said, and the one item that went over its allotted budget was the Wireless 911 fund, which comes from a 53-cent monthly tax on wireless and home phone over by \$1,000 due to a "simple

funds were bumped up a little, Mr. Thompson said, which is good, and the general fund stood at about \$114,000.

Every one of the funds ended up in the black, Mr. Thompson reported, with the exception of Economic Development and Rural Fire District funds, which zeroed out.

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
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
