Chamber changes course

With a proposed merger with the Oberlin Business Alliance and the resignation of its manager and a board member, you might think that the Decatur County Area Chamber of Commerce would be shaking in its boots – but it's not.

Manager Carolyn Hackney, citing a difference of opinion about the Chamber's "new direction," resigned last week. Her last day was to be Monday. Board member Marvin Slabaugh also resigned at Wednesday's board meeting, saying that he can no longer make it to the meetings due to work.

But there was an unexpected benefit to the shake-up, as the board decided it won't be hiring a replacement for Ms. Hackney, which frees up the money spent on her salary for other activities. Chamber President David Swank said that this dovetails well with the new vision for the organization he has been touting since he was elected at the Sept. 5 meeting.

That vision, he said, is to join forces with the alliance and the Oberlin-Decatur County Economic Development Corp. The alliance, he said, already focuses its energies on businesses that are already here. The Chamber, he said, should be working with the economic development agency to bring new business in.

Because there is no longer someone at the office to take phone calls, the board decided, the Chamber phone will be forwarded to the cell phone of a designated board member. If anyone has any questions or needs help, they can still call the main number, (785) 475-3441, said Chamber Secretary Sharleen Wurm

Committees were assigned to work on upcoming Chamber projects. The board will be busy through the holiday season, and many events are right around the corner.

First off was the "welcome wagon" program, headed by Treasurer Ruth Miesner. Many items have already been donated for the wel-

come bags, she reported, including handouts from different businesses, coupons, a list of churches in town, and some very nice portfolios and other resources. New residents can sign up to receive the bundle when they go to the city offices to establish utility services, she said, and it will be delivered by a board member. Someone will call back a week later to see if the new resident needs anything.

Mr. Swank said the program will likely start up after Christmas.

Next up is the Kansas Holiday Craft Show, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 24, at The Gateway. The Chamber plans a bake sale this year, and lunch will be served by the Gateway staff. The board expects at least 55 booths featuring leather craft, jewelry, baked goods, kitchenware, Tupperware, needlecraft and more.

After that will be the Christmas Shopping Expo which should be similar to last year, said Mr. Swank, and will feature a holiday bake sale to benefit the Chamber. It will be from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 1, at the Old Bohemian Hall of the Decatur County Museum. Almost all of the spots have filled up for this event, said Mrs. Wurm. More information will be coming closer to the date.

Board member Carrie Morford will head up a committee for the annual door decoration fund raiser. The Chamber is debating what to do for its annual decoration fundraiser sale, but according to Amanda Grafel, who is heading the project, they may be doing something other than their traditional ribbons for the storefronts. They should know within a couple of days, she said.

sdecamp@nwkansas.com The Decatur County Area Chamber of Commerce board members proposed joining forces with the Oberlin Business Alliance during a meeting last Wednesday and agreed to go to the alliance's meeting today, where the alliance said they would consider it.

The proposal comes on the heels of some big changes at the Chamber, including the resignation of manager Carolyn Hackney, who said prior to the meeting that she decided to part ways with the organization because she didn't agree with its new direction.

That direction, which is being spearheaded by Chamber President David Swank, includes using the money previously used to pay Ms. Hackney to broaden Chamber activities instead of hiring a new manager.

Mr. Swank proposed a merger of sorts with the alliance, the crux of which will be dual membership in both organizations. Today, if a business wants to join both, Mr. Swank said, it has to pay dues to both. which amounts to \$200. But Chamber membership is down, he said. Member Kurt Vollertsen said the alliance's numbers haven't changed in the last few years. Any way you look at it, Mr. Swank insisted, both groups should come out ahead.

The alliance has been helping will receive a trophy and 50 in pay the manager's salary of 12,000a year. Now that they don't - and apparently won't - have to do that, both should have more to spend, Mr. Swank said. If they work together and solicit members together, he added, then they can probably get even more money for bigger projects.

After the resignation of Ms. Hackney, there seemed to be concern among board members that the Chamber itself was either going to evolve or die out - a concern others were quick to dispel.

"Nothing is falling apart," said Chamber Secretary Sharleen Wurm the day after the meeting. "Each board member is stepping up and sharing the work. People can still call the Chamber for anything they need, or they can always call one of the board members."
