As the days shorten and temperatures drop, thoughts turn to winter weather.

There's no time like the present to review winter weather safety issues. As we move from fall to winter, in Kansas and the rest of the Central Plains, we can see rapidly changing weather conditions.

It is not unknown to have the warmest reading of the day occur in the early morning hours. It is also possible to have the high temperatures drop 40 degrees from one day to the next. Differences between the high and low temperatures on a single day can be even greater. This means that whether you are working or walking outside, you should be prepared for the changing weather. Know what to expect and dress appropriately.

At this time of the year, that usually means layers that you can add or remove as the conditions change. A little preparation will allow you to enjoy the weather, whatever it brings.
