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High school holds veterans program

The National Honor Society organized a special assembly to honor and remember all veterans on Monday, Nov. 12, the day after Veterans Day. The program, organized by the National Honor Society, started off with the Oberlin American Legion posting the colors. The students all rose and recited the pledge of allegiance, which was followed by the DCHS Singers singing the "National Anthem." Society officers Miki Dorshorst, Matthew Helm, Kade Brown and Jalyn Shaw introduced the 49 veterans in attendance. Kade told the history of Veterans Day and why we celebrate it today. "In 1918, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, World War I ended," said Kade. Nov. 11 became known as Armistice Day, which was later changed to Veterans Day and then made a national holiday by President Eisenhower in 1954. Zach May introduced the guest speaker, Sid Metcalf, who enlisted in the army after two of his friends were drafted. Mr. Metcalf spoke about his service in Germany and

encouraged anyone who isn't sure what they want to do after high school to consider the military. Closing the program was the singing of "America the Beautiful" by the veterans, students and community members. 

Students show off math skills

Oberlin math students showed off their skills at the 34th Annual Math Relays at Fort Hays State University on Nov. 8. Numerous challenging events were organized for high school students by the Fort Hays State Math and Computer Science Department. Almost 2,000 tests were completed and scored in six categories: Using Number Sense, Trigonometry, Algebraic Manipulations, Informal Geometry and Measurement, Applications of Algebra and Arithmetic, and Calculations with Calculators. Fifteen students represented Oberlin at the relays: Zach May, Miki Dorshorst, Mathew Helm, Matt Glading, Sierra Lohofener, Baron Green, Hannah May, Nick Ashley, Alexis Hissong, Regent Erickson, Garrett Scott, Kaine Fredrickson, Ganon Henningson, Kade Grafel, Alexandra Waterman. As a team, Oberlin placed sixth out of 17 teams in the 2A/3A division with 48 points. Thomas More Prep won the division with 117. In each event, a school could enter up to six students to compete individually and a maximum of two teams, consisting of three students each. No student could participate in an event as both an individual and as a team member. Individuals competed against individuals and teams against teams. In Informal Geometry and Measurement, the tenth grade team consisting of Regent, Kaine, and Ganon were first out of 20 teams. As an individual, Garret Scott placed second out of 74 sophomores.

In Applications of Algebra, our tenth grade team of Regent, Garrett, and Kaine placed first out of 23. In trigonometry the eleventh grade team consisting of Sierra, Hannah, and Nick placed second out of 30 teams. In Calculations with Calculators as an individual Regent placed second out of 59 in the sophomore division, and the junior team consisting of Baron, Sierra, and Alexis placed third out of 25. In the team competitions, teams members worked on a test and marked the answer card in succession, somewhat along the lines of a track relay. Each team had to decide in advance who would work on the test first, second, and last. The first two members had 6.5 minutes each, with the remainder of the time going to the last member. Students were allowed to make notes on the test to tell successive team members which problems had been done. Kade Grafel was fourth in ninth grade Informal Geometry and Measurement. Miki Dorshorst was seventh in the same category for twelfth grade. Kade was also fourth in Applications of Algebra and Arithmetic and ninth in Using Number Sense. In Calculations with Calculators, Nick Ashley was tenth in the junior division, and Zach May was eighth among twelfth grade individuals. In Using Number Sense, students were tested on alternate names for numbers, number patterns, place value, order relations among numbers, estimation, elementary probability and statistics, and reasonableness of results.

In Trigonometry, they had to recognize and use trigonometric identities, solve triangles, including use of laws of sines and cosines, solve equations involving trigonometric and inverse trigonometric functions, use radian and degree measure, and use vectors and complex numbers and polar form for complex numbers. Students competing in Algebraic Manipulations had to add, subtract, multiply, and divide polynomials and rational fractions; factor polynomials; find least common denominator of polynomial fractions; and simplify complex fractions. In Informal Geometry and Measurement, students had to compute perimeters, areas, and volumes of given geometric figures. The emphasis in Applications of Algebra, arithmetic was on interpreting and solving problems presented in words rather than symbols. To compete in Calculations with Calculators, students used scientific calculators with functions that include probability, trigonometry, and logarithms, as well as algebraic functions such as roots and radicals.



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
