Ambulance rates go up for county

The cost of riding in a Decatur County ambulance went up Nov. 1, as county commissioners agreed to increase charges to \$400 a trip and \$10 per mile driven with a patient. The old rate was \$300 and \$7.50 per mile.

The hike came a week after the commissioners approved an increase in the fee ambulance workers are paid for each run from \$20 to \$25, which made their pay and volunteer firemen's the same.

The decision to raise rates came at the commissioners' meeting Oct.31 after Emergency Medical Services Director Linda Manning reported on what other counties in the area charged and found that Decatur could be doing better.

"It hasn't changed in about four or five years," Ms. Manning said, "so we're just trying to raise it to help

cover costs '

She noted that Sheridan County, for example, is charging \$450 a run and \$15 a mile, as does Norton. Chevenne County charges \$400 and \$11.22 per mile and Rawlins County is \$450 and \$8.50 per mile.

These charges are typically sent to the patient's insurance, though if the person is uninsured, the patient is responsible.

Ms. Manning said that one of the ambulances hit a deer on Oct. 20, though thankfully it wasn't the new one. The deer took out a headlight, siren, emergency lights and the grill, for total damage of about \$5,000. The crew was taking a patient from Norcatur to Norton, she said, but no one was injured and they finished the run.

Ms. Manning told commissioners that she had found "deer guards" for two ambulances for \$825 a piece, and their purchase was approved.

sdecamp@nwkansas.com Members of the Decatur County Fair Foundation board met with county commissioners to report on their financial standing and discuss planned improvements at the fairgrounds.

The foundation helps to raise tax-deductible donations for improvements at the fairground while the county Fair Board runs the fair. Members said that their biggest project right now in planned improvements to the livestock building.

County Treasurer Jean Ann Hale said at the meeting Oct. 23 that the foundation has \$11,935 in its savings account and \$733 in checking. \$8,299 of that is earmarked for the livestock building, she said, leaving \$4,368 for other improvements.

Aside from the livestock building, President Robert May said that the foundation hopes to fix up the open-class building, put fencing around the beer garden behind the grandstands and build a new ticket booth and offices that can serve as a central hub for people to enter the grounds through.

To do all this, however, they will need to raise more money through public donations and gifts from wills. Because the board is just now starting to get bids on the work, he said, the members are not sure yet how much they need to raise.

"We'll see how much we can do it for," said Mr. May, "or if we want to postpone it a year, or do what we can with what we have. It may take two or three years to phase in."

Verizon to offer 4G network in town
