

County could adopt two new programs

sdecamp@nwkansas.com The U.S. Department of Homeand Security has two programs that Decatur County qualifies for, county commissioners heard at their to the county.

The first is an identification prosecond is for portable computers, said Emergency Preparedness Director Jacque Boultinghouse.

"(The first) project is to give each county a mobile express unit that will tie into our (identification) tag system," Ms. Boultinghouse said. "It will help us if we should have any incident, and we can use it on a day-to-day basis.

"If there is a fire or something, like over the summer, you can scan the tag if a lot of people are coming in. Then if it's declared a disaster, we can log the people, workers and equipment that comes in, because (the Federal Emergency Management Agency) has resource equipment that they pay for during a disaster, and it would all be logged."

The tags would have individual bar codes for each employee that would sync up with the county's computer system, she said. They could also be used to verify that people had been to required meetings, and could benefit dispatch by allowing them to organize people in places on the computer, and not just
