## **Fort Hays State president** touts state jobs program

sdecamp@nwkansas.com There's a plan in place to create 50,000 new jobs – and Fort Hays State University is smack dab at the center of it.

"We're about to embark on a grand experiment that the governor is leading us on," said President Ed Hammond, who stopped by Oberlin on a tour of northwest Kansas on Friday.

"We're reducing taxes first, growing 50,000 new jobs, and most importantly, educational institutions are making sure they have 50,0000 trained people for the workforce when those jobs become available.'

The university is ready to rise to the challenge, Mr. Hammond said, because it already offers a highquality education for a low cost.

The university is the fourth-fastest growing institution in the country, according to an analysis done by U.S. News and World Report, and at Fort Hays, Mr. Hammond said, 94 percent of graduates last May were employed in their field of study or admitted to graduate school.

That's the highest placement percentage in Kansas.

So to create 50,000 new workers for 50,000 new jobs may sound like a tall order, but he says he isn't worried

"To create these jobs, we aren't just offering a low tuition rate for a high quality education," he said, "we're catering to the needs of business and industry. Just producing graduates doesn't help; we need to produce the ones they need (with the modern training that's in demand). "We've put together cooperative

efforts with business and industry. We've networked and gotten advisory groups so they can give us feedback on what they need.

"If we wait until businesses actually need (these workers), then there's a lag between needing employees and getting them there. But we know in advance to build the skill set they want."

will be matching graduates to businesses, so that the students know about the positions before they take them, and even intern at the businesses before they graduate.

"We do a lot of internships," he said."Employers like them because they bring in three or four people, knowing they'll hire two of them. It's a win-win situation, and good for the students - they graduate with both their education and the experience they need in the field."

The school is poised to succeed in its efforts due to its clever financial

dealings, Mr. Hammond said. Investing in their programs, and still being able to keep tuition low - the school costs half as much as Kansas State - is no easy feat.

He credits the school's China program, wherein it educates students abroad and in Hays, while raking in millions.

"China paid \$10.3 million last vear to educate their students with us," he said. "It cost us about \$5 to \$6 million, so we used that savings to keep tuition low. It's a win for the university because we internationalize our students, and for China because they get an American degree."

Also keeping tuition low are the university's efforts toward energy efficiency, he said.

"We're more efficient than other universities," Mr. Hammond said. "For example, with electricity, we could spend \$2 million a year, but we developed a strategy to reduce it, and next year we'll spend less than \$500,000.

"There's always a demand and a usage charge on your electricity bill, Mr. Hammond said that the school and the demand charge is based on the maximum electricity you use within 15 minutes in a year.

> "And you pay this charge every single month. So we put in natural gas generators and monitor the peak usage in August. We turn on our generators and shave off that peak, and we've saved a half million dollars with that.

"Then we're also adding two giant wind generators, and we'll save a million there, so we've taken a \$2 million bill and turned it into \$500,000."
