75 YEARS AGO - Dec. 1937

Tuesday afternoon about 1:30 clock a man walked into the Dresden State Bank where Ben S. Bowman, the cashier, was in the bank alone, had just finished counting a new shipment of money. The man quietly drew a gun and demanded

the pile of bills amounting to just \$422 which had just been placed in drawer. Another pile of bills which lay to his left he completely overlooked.

He asked if that was all and when Mr. Bowman started to open the currency drawer to show him that 50 YEARS AGO - Dec. 1962 there was no more there, the bandit told him to put up his hands.

He directed Mr. Bowman to the back and to the basement where he bound his hands with wire and told him to lie on the floor. When Mr. Bowman objected, the man did not insist but went up the steps and out the back door and walked a block east to the Foster Lumber Company where he entered a sedan which was parked there.

R.R.Helmer, manager of the FosterLumberCompany, who had been at the bank had met the strange man on his return to his business.

Shortly afterwards he realized he had left something at the bank and on his return met the man again who passed the time of day with him.

When he reached the bank he discovered what had occurred and released Mr. Bowman's hands and they immediately called Sheriff Corral Bainter at Oberlin.
