# City gives OK to airport plan

Airport supporters asked for and got the Oberlin City Council's blesshelp pay for a new, longer runway able to safely accommodate larger planes in all weather.

Spokesman Greg Lohoefener told the council that the group wanted to know that it will have the support of the city when it goes to ask for money from the Federal Aviation Administration in Kansas City.

One problem is that the existing north-south runway was shortened by 300 feet when the city rebuilt it last year. That was done to meet new federal regulations requiring a safety zone between the end of the runway and outside activity or buildings, in this case traffic on U.S. 36 and the fairground parking lot.

The federal agency said it could only pay for rebuilding the old runway under that project, though because the ground drops off to the north, it can't be extended.

Mr. Lohoefener said that the airport supporters have shown there are 12 planes based here instead of the five figured in the last government estimate.

He gave out a sheet breaking down cost estimates for a 5.500 foot runway, which he said would cost about \$6 million. With a 10 percent match for the city, that would translate into a cost of \$750,000 to they will need to add about a 10 percent cushion for extra expenses and Lohoefener said. the cost of land acquisition, which could be close to \$1 million.
