and what food should be tossed can be confusing, given the various terms used with dates printed on food containers.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Safety and Inspection Service defines each of the terms as follows:

A "sell-by" date tells the store how long to display the product for sale. You should buy the product before the date expires.

A "best if used by (or before)" date is recommended for best flavor or quality. It is not a purchase or safety date.

A "use-by" date is the last date recommended for the use of the product while at peak quality. The date has been determined by the manufacturer.

"Closed or coded dates" are packing numbers for use by the manufacturer. For safety concerns, these dates

are more important for perishable foods like meat, poultry, dairy and

It is recommended to use food by the "use-by date." Smelling food to determine if it is safe is not always effective. Many bacteria that cause foodborne illnesses cannot be seen,

smelled or tasted. Even if you think first. When putting away groceries, the food — such as lunch meat smells and looks fine, it's best not to consume after the "use-by" or

If you want to keep the food longer than that date, freeze it. Milk that has been properly refrigerated (40 degrees F) is safe to consume for one week past the "sell by" date.

For concerns about canned foods, high-acid foods (such as tomatoes or pineapple) will have the best quality if used within 12 to 18 months. Low-acid foods (such as meat,

fish, or vegetables) will retain the

best quality if used within 2 to 5 These rules apply only if the can remains in good condition and is

stored in a cool, clean, dry place.

Use the first in, first out method to be sure the oldest cans are used

place the recently purchased items behind the existing food.

It is recommended that homecanned foods be used within one year for best quality.

'The Resurrection and the Life'

Is there anything worse than death?

Sure, we say that "death is part of life," but it wasn't always that way. Adam and Eve's choice to disobey God in the Garden of Eden brought about the fatal curse for all of us. Since then, maybe we've grown accustomed to death; maybe we've had to.

When I was in high school, it seemed like all my parents' friends were dying young. For a few years, we went to a lot of funerals. I got to thinking about the music I'd want at my funeral. Several years later, strong enough to answer death. a friend said, "Um, shouldn't you be planning your wedding?" It hadn't occurred to me that maybe it was unusual for a healthy young woman to be planning her funeral instead of her wedding. But even if I hadn't watched my parents grieve in those years, I would have encountered the finality of death eventually. We all do. Sometimes we encounter death from a safer distance, but sooner or later it hits our own homes.

Mary and Martha were weighed down with fresh grief when Jesus finally showed up in (John 11). They had just buried their brother, Lazarus. But the loss was more terrible because they knew that Jesus could have healed Lazarus, but he did not come in time when living Christ.

they sent for him. Then, to everyone's astonishment, Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead, even though he had already been in his tomb for four days.

But when he grew older, Lazarus died again. Everybody does. It's in the midst of the reality of death that we encounter Easter. And thank God. I don't know about you, but I need more than family get-togethers and artificially-colored marshmallow chicks. I need more than a nice Spring holiday. I need something

Jesus said to Martha, when she was still in the midst of her pain, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die" (John 11:25).

Soon after this visit, Jesus himself died. Then God raised him from the dead, and now, "death has been swallowed up in victory" (1 Corinthians 15:54). When Jesus called himself "the resurrection and the life," he wasn't just talking about what would happen to dead Lazarus, he was talking about the living hope (1 Peter 1:3) available to all who believe.
