


Program could secure future

the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service to protect, restore and develop wetlands on their property can benefit from lease payments and

cost-share grants for their land.

"In Kansas, more than 24,000 acres have been restored or are in the process of being restored under the Wetlands Reserve Program," said Daniel H. Meyerhoff, acting state conservationist in charge of the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service in Kansas. "The benefits of these restored wetlands reach well beyond their boundaries to improve watershed health and the vitality of agricultural lands, as well as the aesthetics and economies of local communities."

He said the program helps landowners restore and protect wetland ecosystems on private and tribal lands. Owners may select either a permanent or 30-year easement, or a 10-year restoration contract while retaining ownership of the land.

Wetlands benefit migratory birds, other wildlife and plants, including species of concern and those that

Farmers and ranchers who join are listed on state and federal lists of threatened and endangered species, Meyerhoff said. The program also helps restore active floodplains along creeks and rivers, aids in flood control and improves water quality by restoring environmentally sensitive, frequently flooded cropland back to permanent vegetation.

Wetlands provide alternatives for areas where crops are lost to high water, increase wildlife opportunities, help with groundwater recharge and improve water quality by filtering out sediment.

Under the program, farmers may earn up to \$2,600 per acre for areas enrolled in easements, receive up to 100 percent cost share for developing wetland areas, turn problem wet areas into an income source while retaining ownership and access control and increase wildlife habitat.
