Plans to revitalize businesses in Oberlin

Business Alliance meets with Chamber

rtaylor@nwkansas.com County Appraiser Alan Hale, who has worked with Norton and other counties on the Neighborhood Revitalization Programs, urged Decatur County commissioners and an audience of 10, including three Oberlin City Council members and one Norcatur councilman, to get on with the program.

Mr. Hale said the program would allow owners to receive tax rebates on new construction and improvements, giving them an incentive to invest in Oberlin and the county.

Under the plan, property owners would be reimbursed 100 percent of new taxes paid in the first year, with the rebated amount declining 10 percent every year for 10 years. Other counties already are benefit-

ing from the program, he said.

"We're behind everyone else," Mr. Hale said. "Right now would be the best time to do it."

Economic Development Director Connie Grafel said there has been a decline in Oberlin's population since 2010, which has affected the city's economic growth. She said she was at treasurers' meeting and she believes the rebates would help new business owners.

"The first year is crucial to getting your business off the ground," Ms. Grafel said.

Mr. Hale said there will be an application fee for the program, which is based off an estimate of the increase in value.

Recreation Board member Gary Juenemann met with the commissioners to follow up on a solution retire, and the new salary would help for compensating the recreation board for money it received that was not accounted for in this year's budget.

The board is only allowed \$6,500 for the year, only allowing it to spend just \$500 of donations received. The board has collected over \$10,000 in fees and donations, however.

The commissioners agreed to pay the difference that exceeded the budget limit. The board will receive a voucher from the county's general fund, which is where the remaining money went, commissioners decided.

Mr. Juenemann asked that the commissioners expand the recreation budget to \$10,000 for next year. Commissioners said they will review the numbers from this year's budget before they make a decision, however.

A rotation system for non-resident water consumers will be developed by the City Administrator.

Outdoor water use, including lawn watering and car washing will be restricted to from 12:01 AM to 9:00 AM, and from 8:00 PM to midnight.

Refilling of private swimming pools will be allowed one day a week after sunset.

Emergency water rates may be imposed. Waste of water is prohibited.
