Asked about what affected him the most, Michael said, "It was how we were able to build relationships with the people whose houses we were working

"One trailer house in a nearby town was on the brink of being condemned. The man who lived there had no water, electricity or plumbing. He had lost his job as a cotton-combine mechanic at the local John Deere dealership due to spine trouble, and he hadn't had a well-paying job since.

"We painted his house, rebuilt a wall and patched the roof. He was so grateful for all that we did for him. It made me realize that these are real people with real problems, just like us in northwest Kansas and southwest Nebraska."

Jude Walinder and Caleb Koerperich were on the team that went to Jamaica, led by Oberlin Teens for Christ leader Doug Mason. They spent a week helping Kingdom Builders Ministries with its evangelistic outreach, some with labor projects and some ministering to people of all ages.

"My mission trip to Jamaica was an incredible experience," Caleb said. "While we were down there, I had a lot of eye-opening experiences. I loved ministering to the people and playing with all of the children there. I even enjoyed the chicken-foot

Over 30 readers participated in the "Dig Into Reading" program at the Selden Public Library during


